
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Tour of Homes Fundraiser Essential to VNA Events

Macon Found To Have Cleanest Car Interiors In Nation!

Persian Literature, The Beatles and Vineville

You may ask "What does this mean, what does it have to do with us and who really cares?" It's a good question but it's also a good story.

Back in 1970, English musician Eric Clapton was in love. It was a bit one sided but he was in love nevertheless. A friend of Eric's had given him a book of Persian Literature that included Nizami Ganjavil's "The Story of Layla and Majnu" and it got Eric's attention. It is a story of a young man who fell in love with a beautiful, unavailable, woman and went crazy because he couldn't marry her. To Eric Clapton, "Layla" happened to be Pattie Boyd, who happened to be the wife of his friend (and Beatle) George Harrison.

Pattie was a model (a rather hot one) who met George on the film set of "A Hard Day's Night" and whether it was the fame or the fortune or both, he was somehow able to convince her to marry him. Thank God for that because one of the greatest rock albums ever recorded was the result of this mess.

In 1970, Eric assembled a group of musicians and named the band Derek and the Dominos. They traveled to Miami and recorded an album which would become "Layla and Other Assorted Love Songs." One evening, while taking a break from recording, Eric went to see The Allman Brothers Band who were playing a concert nearby. Eric was a big fan of Duane and Duane was a big fan of Eric and because of the mutual admiration Duane headed back over to the studio and loaned some guitar work to Derek and the Dominos. Duane's involvement is well known in music circles but if you pick up a copy of that legendary album, listen carefully to the slide guitar. That was Duane Allman doing what Duane Allman did best! When you hear the song "Layla", the famous opening riff was Duane's also. That bit of Duane Allman's Gold Top Les Paul guitar work made "Layla" one of the most recognized songs in rock and roll history.

Pattie divorced George in 1977 and married Eric in 1979. In 1977 Eric wrote another love song for Pattie titled "Wonderful Tonight" but I guess love songs were not the key to a happy marriage. They finally divorced in 1988. The Gold Top Les Paul survived all of this drama and is on display at The Allman Brothers Big House Museum. Go by and take a look!

Macon is Preservation

With over 6,000 historic resources and 14 National Register Historic Districts, Macon is teeming with preservation. The historic Vineville neighborhood directly contributes to maintaining this unique historic identity. Since 2012, VNA and Historic Macon Foundation have partnered to encourage preservation efforts through low interest façade loans to enhance the exterior



appearance of homes within the Vineville neighborhood. Past home improvement projects supported by the loans include landscaping, window repairs, and roofing replacements.

One \$5,000 Vineville façade loan is still available to residents. Eligible uses of the loan include exterior painting, exterior repairs to masonry, stairs, porches, siding, roofing repairs, professional design service fees, and permanent landscaping. The interest rate for the loan is 3% and fully amortized and repayable over 5 years with a monthly payment of \$90.96. Historic Macon's mission is to "revitalize our community through preserving architecture and sharing history." Our largest revitalization effort is in Beall's Hill, where we rehabilitate historic properties or build new construction to encourage revitalization throughout the neighborhood. This work, made possible with generous support from The Knight Foundation, has even gained attention from the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Macon is now the statewide leader for the number of historic tax credit projects—greatly surpassing both Savannah and Atlanta. To share our history, the Historic Macon Foundation hosts monthly Salon series ranging from walking tours to talks with local historians. Our upcoming "Macon History" summer series features topics such as the history of Bowden Golf Course and NuWay. Currently, Historic Macon is accepting nominations for endangered places or structures that are threatened by neglect or possible demolition to be placed on our new "Macon's Fading Five" list. Our goal is to develop viable strategies that will support preservation efforts for these historic properties. If you know of a threatened property, please submit a nomination through our website.

Ultimately, preservation is more than saving historic buildings. It's about preserving the intricate stories woven into the very fabric of buildings. We're committed to preserving and sharing these stories, but we're not alone in these endeavors. Not only do we have a strong core of members and volunteers passionate about preservation, but residents throughout the community contribute to preservation efforts on a daily basis.
