Letter from the President

Did you know that you live in a part of Macon that used to be vineyards? This is where the name Vineville originated.

Vineville began in the early 1800s as an area full of large plantation estates and farms. What is now called Vineville Avenue was built as a dirt road in the 1830s to connect Macon to Forsyth. Around 1900, the village of Vineville began to expand into a suburb of the City of Macon. During this same period, the farms and plantations began to be subdivided and side streets leading off Vineville Avenue were laid out. The new houses reflected the changing times as the excesses of the Victorian period prompted a return to simpler designs and materials. Bungalows and cottages with wide front porches and natural materials like river stone and wood became popular.

The Vineville area, now the Vineville Historic District stretches from I75 to the Blind Academy on Vineville. The Vineville Neighborhood Association (VNA) was founded in 1978 and immediately began working toward the status of historic district designated by the U.S. Department of the Interior's National Register of Historic Places which was achieved in 1980. The VNA has continued to be an active organization working to preserve the historic nature of our neighborhood.

VNA is a open to all residents of the Vineville Historic District.





Upcoming events include the Blue and White party in April, another LNO in May, and a porch party in June. Hope you see you at one or more of these events!














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2017 VNA Blue & White Party

VNA's Blue & White Party returns for 2017 with an earlier date—April 22nd—with hopes for cooler temperatures for this outdoor event. The evening will feature the jazz sounds of Harold E. Thomas and Danger Zone and will, once again, offer prizes for best table décor.

VNA will provide one eight-foot table, eight chairs, and a large white table linen to each entry for \$100. All money from table sales will be used for the improvement and development of Oak Haven Park. Once you have registered for a table, you are free to fill your eight chairs, decorate your table for the competition, and set your food and drink menu. Please note this competition is not to be taken lightly. Last year, one entrant who casually entered the event was overheard stating, "This will not happen to me again." Think steeplechase, or pregame at The Grove in Oxford, Mississippi or candelabras, china, and silverware—dress up, not down, and ladies in hats made a splash in 2016. By all means, think blue and white!

And finally, the 2017 Blue & White Party will be for a cause: Oak Haven Park. - Contribution to the park sign \$3,000
- Asymmetrical climbing structure \$7,700
- Outdoor musical instrument ensemble \$25,000 (and, yes, if you insist, we will allow you to underwrite the cost of any one of the five instruments for \$5,000.00)

In the end, the 2017 Blue & White Party will be a wonderful event for those in attendance on the evening of April 22, 2017, and will do wonderful things for our own Oak Haven Park. We hope to see you there!

Each month the HVNA has a monthly, hour-long clean-up session dedicated to a section of our neighborhood.


February 2017—members worked at the corner of English Avenue and Oak Haven Avenue.
